A helping hand for a physically impaired young man and his family

Twenty-two-year-old Eugene Beradje and his family were desperate for help. Eugene, suffering from complications from a snake bite as a young boy in his African homeland is wheelchair bound and unable to move himself. His father can no longer lift him. So MHT volunteers, under the direction of Jared Parker, Damon Perdue and Robin Egan and many others, installed a ceiling track and harness to help lift this valiant young man and literally slide him from room to room in their Rose Park home. He can even take a bath with the help of this unique device. Designing and installing the welcome feature took months of thoughtful discussion before this engineering feat, possibly the first of its kind, was completed--and a young man's burden was lifted.



<u>Youth Program</u>

Doug and Becky Farley have been busy building youth comradery in Rose Park with dances, activities and all kinds of events. At the forefront of their efforts has been developing a core of youth who now manage a viable and very active Rose Park Youth Committee. They plan and oversee events under the tutelage of the Farleys. Recently, they planned a successful Sports Night at the CRC that attracted over 50 young men and women and will now be held monthly. Rose Park area youth are also participating in "Chill" which is an opportunity for teens to learn how to snowboard. A motivational seminar at each "Chill" event is also included.
