

We have really enjoyed working to help Pastor Darryell Jackson and his great congregation.

We started a Help Center in the three SLC areas of My Hometown, and people would come in to get help with many different things. This was focused on non-members. We all did it for a few months, but it seemed that our missionaries as well as those from the Wasatch Front Mission were sitting around most of the time with nothing to do. So it was finally decided to close the Help Centers after a good try. 
